As a longstanding recipient of the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll and the Carnegie Foundation's Community Engagement Classification, West Chester University is committed to the values of service, equity, collaboration, stewardship, creativity, and innovation. Faculty, staff, and students all play an important role in upholding these principles. As a means of instilling these values in students, WCU strives to engage students in meaningful public service through service-learning courses and volunteer opportunities.

**The Office of Service-Learning and Volunteer Programs (OSLVP)** is charged with promoting community engaged learning experiences that address critical community needs by building mutually beneficial partnerships and empowering students to be active citizens in their local, national, and global communities. To achieve this mission, OSLVP collaborates with a wide array of non-profit

and governmental agencies as well as disseminates information about service-learning, resources, and professional development opportunities to students, faculty, staff, and community members.

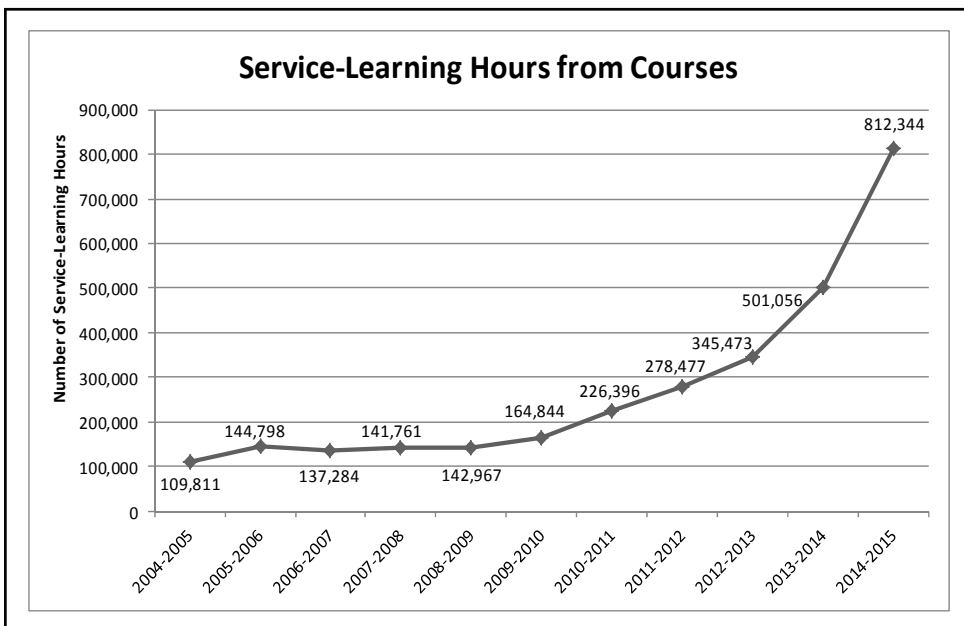
This fall, OSLVP hit the ground running with several new and improved programs and events. Some of these included course presentations, trainings for student leaders responsible for mobilizing thousands of volunteers in our community, faculty workshops, new student service projects, and community-wide events.

The semester also began with an exciting move from the basement of Killinger Hall to the second floor of the Lawrence Center. This move has allowed for a significant increase in visibility and traffic to the department.

This annual report serves as an opportunity to share the impressive public service efforts of our campus community.

## FIGURES AT A GLANCE

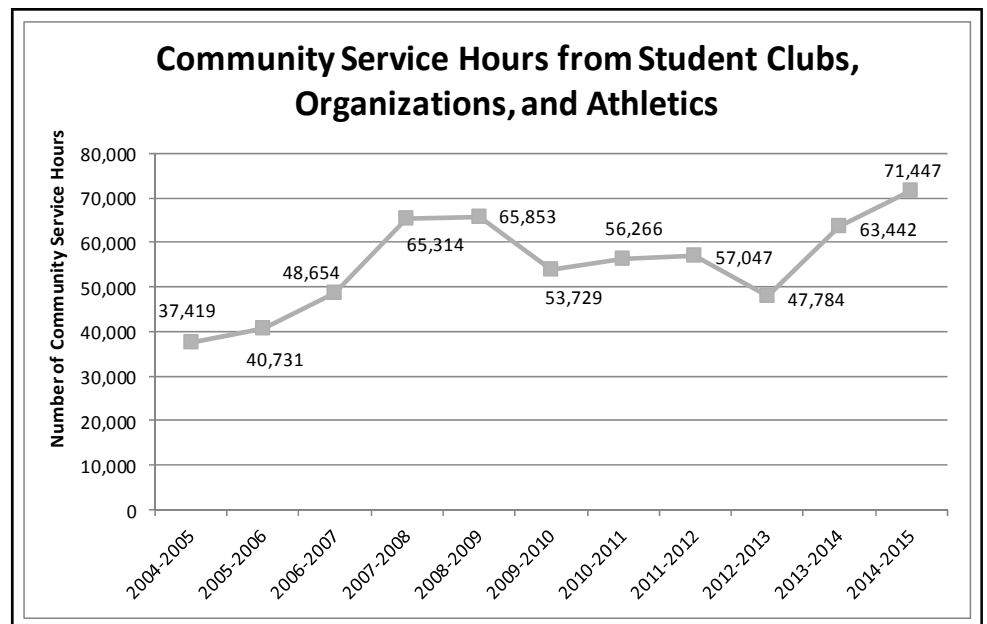
During the 2014-2015 academic year, nearly **7,500** students participated in public service through service-learning coursework. These students' efforts amounted to more than **812,000** hours of service. Co-curricular service programs and events generated **93,114** hours of public service and raised **\$146,371** for various nonprofit organizations. Members of over **130** student clubs, organizations, and athletic teams performed **71,447** of these hours advocating for social causes, participating in philanthropy, and engaging in direct service. These combined efforts supported **347** different community agencies.




# ACADEMIC SERVICE-LEARNING

## CANVASSING PROJECT

With the creation of the Service-Learning Canvassing Project, OSLVP and the Faculty Work Group took a new approach to encouraging more WCU faculty to integrate service into their courses. Over two semesters (spring 2014 and fall 2014), nine selected faculty from a range of disciplines took advantage of this professional development opportunity to learn best practices in implementing academic service-learning, become familiar with a variety of relevant resources, and engage other faculty with this new knowledge.

As a result of this project, the faculty participants reached out to over 60 other WCU faculty members. Twenty-six faculty members showed an interest in learning more about the teaching method and available resources, and 15 new service-learning course sections were identified to be added to OSLVP's aggregated data. Additionally, there are 10 more potential new service-learning course sections on the horizon to be developed by faculty who want to enrich a course they teach with service-learning.

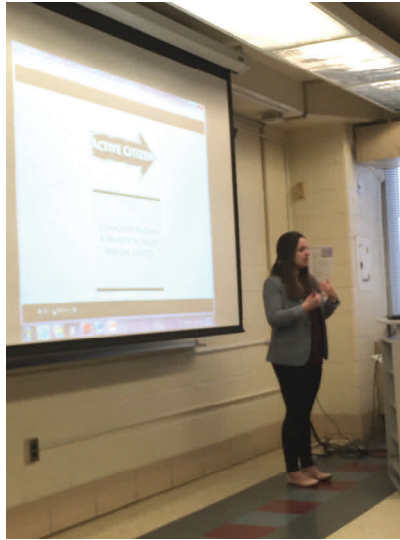

The Community Engagement (CE) Scholars Program trains and supports student leaders to assist faculty members teaching or developing service-learning courses or performing community-based research projects. These Scholars may be undergraduate or graduate students who spend approximately six hours per week supporting the faculty member's work by, for example, preparing volunteer training, collaborating with community agency staff, and leading a reflective activity.

The following service-learning courses benefited from the CE Scholars Program this year: Public Speaking (Communication Studies); Strategic Social Media (Communication Studies); History of Mathematics (Mathematics); Consumer Behavior (Marketing); Environmental Politics and Policy (Political Science); Founda-

tions in Reading (Literacy); Community Nutrition (Nutrition); and Stewardship and Civic Engagement (Honors Program).

To assess the program and get feedback on ways to improve the Program, a survey was administered to faculty, Scholars and to the students enrolled in the courses. Overall, faculty reported that the CE Scholars did an excellent job working with community partners, setting up logistics for service projects, and leading reflective conversations.

**Of the 195 students surveyed in the spring of 2015, 77% agreed or strongly agreed that the community service and service-learning experience of the course helped them see how the subject matter they learned could be useful in everyday life.**



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## WCU PRESENCE AT 2014 PASSHE SUMMIT

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Community Engagement and International Education at WCU were well represented at the 2014 PASSHE Summit: Inclusive Excellence & International Education held at Millersville University in November. Dr. Donna Sanderson, Dr. Linda Stevenson, Jodi Roth-Saks, and Dr. Sara Lamb Kistler presented *Building Excellence in Global Community Engagement*. Jodi discussed the process for developing domestic and international service-learning initiatives that focus on global citizenship, including academic service-learning courses and co-curricular projects. Examples highlighted were Teaching Culturally and Linguistically Diverse Learners (Lamb Kistler), Cap Kits for Emergent Literacy and Mathematics (Sanderson), and Latino Politics and “A Seed on Diamond Street,” an Alternative Spring Break (Stevenson). Other faculty from the Service-Learning Work Group also presented. Dr. Bill Lalicker (English) led a roundtable titled *Study Abroad Funding Awards, Diversity & Access*. Dr. Andrea Varricchio (Languages & Cultures), along with students, discussed bilingual service-learning internships in her presentation, *Learning Global Citizenship via Local Internships*.

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## DR. CHU-CHEN (LIZ) WANG RECEIVES 2015 HORMEL MASTER TEACHER AWARD

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Associate Professor of Marketing Chun-Chen (Liz) Wang, Ph.D. competed for the 13<sup>th</sup> Annual Marketing Management Association Master Teacher Award sponsored by Hormel Foods and was selected as one of the three finalists who were invited to present at the Marketing Management Association Spring Conference in Chicago, IL. Dr. Wang presented a service-learning project offered through the Marketing Consumer Behavior course that allowed students to connect material learned in class with a hands-on project with a goal set to benefit their surrounding community through The Chester County Food Bank. This innovative assignment called for team building, thinking outside of the box and a professional repertoire to present to local non-profits and businesses, all skills consistent and necessary in any real world scenario. Dr. Wang was presented the award at the conference and was thanked for her commitment to teaching excellence. As the service-learning curriculum encourages hands-on learning and breaks the mold of traditional learning models, it also simultaneously aids students to become viable contributors in the West Chester community and beyond.

## TIME IS MONEY!

During 2014-2015, students completed **93,114** hours of service through co-curricular service-learning programs and events. According to Independent Sector's 2014 Value of Volunteer Time ([https://www.independentsector.org/volunteer\\_time](https://www.independentsector.org/volunteer_time)), each volunteer hour is worth \$23.07, which means the co-curricular service-learning hours completed by WCU students equate to **\$2,148,139.98** saved by community agencies served.



## SOAR: NEW STUDENT LEADERSHIP RETREAT

OSLVP partnered with the offices of New Student Programs and Student Leadership and Involvement to infuse a day of service into SOAR, the two-day leadership retreat for incoming first-year and transfer students. Ninety-two new students, 17 student leaders, and 9 WCU staff members participated in the day's events of pre-service education and orientation, public service (at 1 of 9 community agencies), and reflection.

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## WCU HONORED

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Chief Mike Bicking, President Weisenstein, John DiSpaldo, Hannah Caplan, Ezekiel Robinson, Jodi Roth-Saks, and Don Verdiani (Chester County Disaster Action Team member, Red Cross)

The American Red Cross honored three WCU administrators and two WCU students at the 4<sup>th</sup> Annual Chester County Heroes Breakfast in April. The Heroes and WCU were honored for the efforts put forth in February 2014, when West Chester University was approached by the Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare to open a mega shelter after a tragic ice storm knocked out power to 90 percent of Chester County. The Chief of Police, as well as the Emergency Management/Electronic Security Manager at WCU began diligently working with the State and the American Red Cross to put the emergency action plan in place. Each organization had a distinct role. WCU provided the facility, security, volunteers, and other resources needed to assist the State and the American Red Cross. The Office of Service-Learning and Volunteer Programs leveraged 120 student volunteers for the shelter to erect several hundred cots, staff in-take tables, and set up food and public health stations.

The shelter remained open for eight days. Volunteers worked in shifts to help greet and comfort the shelter's temporary residents and provide a guiding hand to navigate the process and the large building. Approximately 200 individuals utilized the shelter, while an additional 30 pets were sheltered in another building on campus. Two WCU students, Hannah Caplan and Ezekiel Robinson, logged over 90 hours assisting at the shelter.

WCU was honored in Harrisburg on April 21, 2015. Dr. Sara Hinkle, along with six students, represented WCU as they were presented with a referendum by State Representative Stephen Kinsey and State Representative Dan Truitt for the University's dedication to public service and for receiving the President's Higher Education Community Service Honor Roll recognition.



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## AMERICA READS PROGRAM

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To achieve the goals of developing and enhancing America Reads (an academic enrichment program for disadvantaged youth), OSLVP held several monthly workshops for the Site Leaders, Federal Work-Study students, and volunteers. Some of these workshops included resume writing, tutoring tips, communication skill development, and multicultural awareness.

In 2014-2015, 26 Federal Work-Study students and over 75 volunteers were recruited and trained to serve as Academic Youth Mentors with America Reads at the following community agencies: The Melton Center, YMCA Childcare Early Learning Center, YMCA Believe & Achieve, Care Center Foundation, West Chester Area Day Care Center, and Blessed Dorothy Day Ministry Center. **These mentors provided over 7,250 hours of service to over 300 children from low-income families.**



America Reads also serves as a strong retention initiative. During the fall semester, 100% of the Federal Work-Study students completed their service and 95% were retained for the following semester. In the spring, 91% of the Federal Work-Study students completed their service; the other 9% resigned from their positions early after finding other employment opportunities that could better meet their financial needs. Of the Federal Work-Study students who did not graduate in 2014-2015, 93% have applied to return to the America Reads program as mentors or Site Leaders for the 2015-2016 academic year.

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## AMERICORPS PACC\*VISTA AT WCU

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OSLVP applied for and received a grant for a full-time, AmeriCorps Pennsylvania Campus Compact (PACC) Vista member to serve as the America Reads Program Coordinator for the 2015-2016 academic year. Starting in July, the VISTA member will work collaboratively with multiple stakeholders to address the academic needs of disadvantaged youth in the area by recruiting, training, and positioning WCU students as mentors in various after-school and childcare programs.



This additional staffing support will provide more attention and direction to the America Reads mentors, Federal Work Study students, Site Leaders, and partnering agencies, as well as allow other OSLVP staff to dedicate more time and attention to other office programs and initiatives.

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## WCU STUDENT RECEIVES NATIONAL SERVICE AWARD

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Megan Hess, a WCU junior, was recognized as an **Everyday Young Hero** by **Youth Service America**, an award reserved for individuals up to age 25 exemplifying an extraordinary commitment to service. Megan was recognized for her role as the Bringing Hope Home WCU Chapter president and for hosting a Halloween Costume 5k that raised over \$1,700 to support a single mother undergoing cancer treatment. The tag line for the event is, "Because fighting cancer alone is scary," which embodies Megan's continuing passion to support families impacted by cancer. Furthermore, in the future she hopes to continue empowering families through a career in pediatric oncology. Megan's dedication to lessening the burden for local families impacted by cancer is another example of the dedication of WCU students to improving the local community through service.





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## STUDENTS IN ACTION

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### A CASE FOR SMILES FOR CONKERR CANCER

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As part of the second annual Conkerr Cancer event, over 125 students and 25 community volunteers gathered to sew bright and colorful pillow cases for children hospitalized due to terminal illness. Through a collaborative effort between OSLVP and multiple student organizations and leaders, the event surpassed and nearly doubled its pillowcase production from the previous year by cheering up over 275 children with a vibrant pillowcase. Furthermore, the event nearly tripled its fundraising efforts, raising nearly \$1,500 for Conkerr Cancer.



Over 125 students participated in this co-sponsored event with the Schock Financial Aid Office to learn about financial literacy and make Valentine's Day cards for senior citizens.



OSLVP and the Schock Financial Aid Office held a financial literacy event with a built in service project to benefit the CCSPCA. Over 50 students made over 70 dog toys.

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### 2015 MLK DAY OF SERVICE

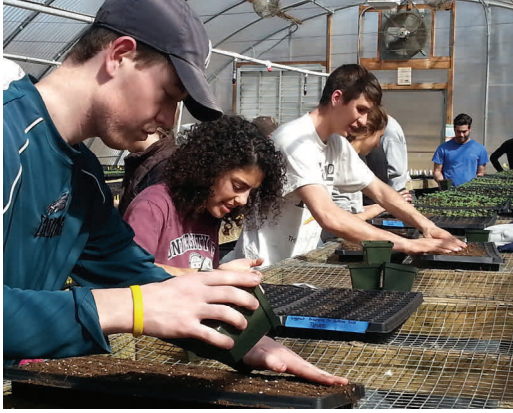
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In honor of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s legacy, 584 students, staff, and community members congregated to make no-sew fleece blankets for children needing extra warmth and comfort in our community. These blankets were distributed to children at the following community agencies: Chester County Hospital's NICU and Pediatrics Department, A.I. DuPont Children's Hospital, and Fleece for Keeps (an organization that provides blankets to youth in foster care). While this is an annual event, this year the service project was divided into two 1.5 hour sessions and a community partner representative was invited to share how the blankets benefit the recipients. With the implementation of these changes, volunteers were able to produce 162 fleece blankets for our community partners.





# ALTERNATIVE BREAK TRIPS



## Creating Sustainable Food Resources for Communities in Eastern PA

13 students and 2 faculty/staff advisors served in community gardens and greenhouses throughout the greater Philadelphia area.



## Educating Youth Across Borders

12 students and 1 faculty advisor traveled to Costa Rica to provide Caps Kits and other instructional materials to low-income elementary schools.



## Serving the Community Impacted by HIV/AIDS

14 students and 1 staff advisor increased awareness of HIV/AIDS prevention and services available in Pittsburgh, PA.



## Building Partnerships through Service in Latin America

9 students and 2 faculty advisors traveled to Guatemala to partner with the University Rafael Landivar to educate youth and build homes.



## Transforming Lives with the Rafiki Africa Foundation

8 students and 2 faculty traveled to Kenya to empower women, increase food security, and enhance education.



## Raising the Roof with Habitat for Humanity

14 students and 1 staff advisor worked with Habitat for Humanity in Buffalo, NY to build and repair homes for low-income families.

The mission of OSVP's Alternative Break program is to promote lifelong, active citizenship among WCU students by providing them with the opportunity to spend their *breaks* doing something meaningful for the common good. During 2014-2015, 70 students dedicated at least a week of their time to doing just this. By addressing social issues of food security, education, environmental conservation, equal rights, public health and awareness, and affordable housing, these students created stronger relationships with their peers, developed a better understanding of different community needs, and became culturally immersed while exploring themselves and the impact they have on their global community.
